	Urban League of Louisiana	\$ 500,000.00	The Subrecipient will provide one-time micro-grants to address the short-term financial needs of microenterprises and small businesses in East Baton Rouge Parish that have been impacted by COVID-19. Recipients may use funds for rent, utilities, inventory, accounts payable, fixed costs, employee wages and benefits.
	Oschner Clinic Foundation	\$ 100,000.00	The Subrecipient will stand-up an integrated primary care and behavioral health care clinic comprised of a 13-member care team of licensed Advanced Practice Providers supported by a Board-Certified physician in Internal Medicine/Family Practice, a licensed Clinical Social Worker, licensed and board-certified nurses and medical assistants, referral coordinators, and administrative support staff. The team will provide care to low-income patients each year. In addition to the in-person care, the clinic will host tele-medicine visits and will be an access point for the Subrecipient's renowned digital medicine programs.
	Our Lady of the Lake Hospital, Inc.	\$ 100,000.00	The Subrecipient will set up mobile clinics, staffed with a nurse practitioner, social worker, registered nurse, and health educator to go out into the community 5 days a week and serve identified LMI zip codes on a rotational basis to provide well care (immunizations, well checks), sick care, supplemental care for chronic disease management, and COVID-19 education on disease prevention, care, and testing all on site. In addition to care, the Subrecipient will provide chronic disease care kits to appropriate patients. The Subrecipient will also create telehealth accessibility in community centers to allow for citizens to have follow up appointments or obtain care via virtual visits without having to obtain the technology for themselves, but be able to sign in to a community center iPad and see a nurse practitioner on demand.
	The Walls Project	\$ 120,000.00	The Subrecipient will expand its current Future's Fund Tech Academy program to help position unemployed low-to-moderate income adults for high demand and highly desirable technology jobs. Futures Fund provides access to training as well as pre-apprentice and apprentice programs that will "up-skill" Louisiana workers for today's technology-dense workplace. The Subrecipient will offer training to adults recently displaced or unemployed due to COVID-19, US Military veterans, and out-of-school youth, as part of the new Futures Fund Coding Boot Camp program.

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	St. Vincent de Paul Community Pharmacy	\$ 100,000.00	The Subrecipient will expand its current Community Pharmacy program to help low-income and homeless individuals with underlying health conditions such as diabetes, high blood pressure and pulmonary diseases who are at high risk of complications from COVID-19, by providing critical access to these medications. Without medication, those served face potentially dire health consequences, including death. In addition, as more individuals lose their employer funded health insurance benefits, access to free prescription medicine is a community priority. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the Subrecipient will focus our services on those vulnerable and who cannot afford their medicines.
	Capital Area Alliance for the Homeless	\$ 100,000.00	The Subrecipient will expand its current One Stop homeless services center in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Subrecipient will create two new positions and provide additional operational support for a currently existing position.
	HIV/AIDS Alliance for Region Two, Inc. dba Open Health Care Clinic	\$ 151,630.00	The Subrecipient will initially utilize the Mobile Response Unit to perform COVID-19 drive-thru testing at community sites throughout the mid-city and North Baton Rouge areas. The specific areas were chosen due to the disparities that exist in the target population. The testing site locations will be expanded as needed. All individuals presenting to the Mobile Unit will receive services, regardless of ability to pay. Community sites where Hispanic populations congregate will be selected to ensure this vulnerable population has access to COVID testing. The days, hours and locations will be monitored to quickly facilitate changes to meet the needs of the target population. Frequency and locations of testing will be determined by positivity rates and the most recent available data of COVID cases.
	Urban Restoration Enhancement Corporation	\$ 180,000.00	The Subrecipient will provide rental assistance to households within Baton Rouge's city limits with gross income at 80% or below the area median income (AMI) that have been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic and are not receiving rental assistance through other organizations or agencies. The rental assistance will be in the form of a one-time grant payment that is paid directly to the tenant's landlord and is based on the tenant's inability to pay rent due to economic harm (loss or reduction of income or employment) as a result of COVID-19 and the ability of the amount of rent assistance payment funds needed to bring the tenant's account current, not to exceed six (6) consecutive months of assistance. Tenants must be the primary lease holder, be living in their eligible primary dwelling unit (apartment, single-family home, duplex-style, townhome, or mobile home), must complete an online application, and provide supporting documentation to determine eligibility.

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	Mid City Redevelopment Alliance, Inc.	\$ 180,000.00	The Subrecipient will manage a relief program for individuals and families experiencing rent and mortgage delinquency as a result of COVID-19 and its negative impact on the local economy. Applicants will be able to submit applications to request assistance for up to three payments of past due rent and/or mortgage, not to exceed six (6) consecutive months in dire situations, that is confirmed to be the direct result of financial hardship resulting from the spread of COVID-19. All hardship requests will be verified through the Subrecipient intake process. The assistance is intended to ensure the applicant family will not be evicted within 30 days of the assistance provided on their behalf.

	St. Vincent de Paul Bishop Ott Men's Shelter	\$ 355,000.00	The Subrecipient will expand its current capacity at the Bishop Ott Men's Shelter to provide 24-hour day and night shelter services, which are keeping homeless men off the streets and in safe, secure environment during the pandemic. This will directly meet the physical needs of homeless men by providing meals, toiletries (for hygiene, which is so important), clothing, etc.
	St. Vincent de Paul Sweet Dreams Women's Shelter	\$ 355,000.00	The Subrecipient will expand its current capacity at the Bishop Ott Sweet Dreams Day and Night Shelter to provide 24-hour day and night shelter services, which are keeping homeless women, children and families off the streets and in safe, secure environment during the pandemic.
	Louisiana Council of Resources	\$ 119,484.00	The Subrecipient will expand its current capacity for the Reintegrated Oriented System of Care reentry program by providing case management through wraparound/supportive services for justice-involved persons with special needs that are homeless in East Baton Rouge parish. The program will focus on individuals impacted by COVID-19. Justice involved persons with special needs are experiencing a lack of housing at a greater number during the COVID-19 pandemic. The Subrecipient anticipates servicing 25 participants for this program.
	Louisiana Youth Connect	\$ 185,896.00	The Subrecipient will provide peer support for youth and families who have suffered loss during the COVID-19 pandemic. In addition, the Subrecipient will provide community resources to vulnerable communities who are currently at risk of or currently diagnosed with the coronavirus. Services may include providing PPE supplies for safety, providing meals during daytime business hours, providing transportation services for youth and families to get to testing sites, and education on nutrition and preventative measures to individuals at risk. Services will be made available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, as needed.

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	Catholic Charities St. Patrick's House	\$ 87,818.00	The Subrecipient will provide transitional housing to homeless pregnant women and their newborn children. This will increase stable housing and employment rates and increase education which will increase salary among homeless mothers and their children. The program provides quality care to the women residing in the Subrecipient care, many of whom have high risk pregnancies, by continuing to transport them to and from doctor's appointments, insuring they have proper medication, and providing transportation to get essential items like food.
	Catholic Charities Joseph Homes	\$ 118,810.00	The Subrecipient will provide transitional housing to homeless unaccompanied men recently released from a parish or state correctional facility. This will increase stable housing and employment rates and reduce recidivism normally seen in this population during the pandemic period. The Subrecipient will provide rental assistance to keep eligible clients in danger of being evicted from permanent housing.

	HIV/AIDS Alliance for Region Two, Inc. dba Open Health Care	\$ 269,394.00	The Subrecipient will provide services through the HOPWA OHCC that reduce the likelihood of persons living with HIV contracting or transmitting COVID-19. It will also allow persons in an area heavily impacted by COVID-19 to meet their basic needs and live at their maximum capacity as the community continues to fight and heal from the pandemic. The Subrecipient will also provide food and other household necessities including cleaning products and toiletries in the form of vouchers and grocery delivery to HOPWA eligible clients experiencing food insecurity.
	Baton Rouge Black Alcoholism Council dba Metro Health Education	\$ 89,562.00	The Subrecipient will provide services to HOPWA clients or potential clients with 1) supportive services, 2) homeless prevention services, and 3) rental assistance. In addition, the Subrecipient will use CV funds to provide staff with laptop computers required to work remotely and personal protective equipment for use when face-to-face contact is required.
